Dan Jurafsky is an associate professor in the Department of Linguistics, and by courtesy in the Department of Computer Science, at Stanford University. From 1996-2003 he was on the faculty of the University of Colorado, Boulder. Dan received a B.A in Linguistics in 1983 and a Ph.D. in Computer Science in 1992, both from the University of California at Berkeley, and was a postdoc 1992-1995 at the International Computer Science Institute in Berkeley. He is the recipient of a 2002 MacArthur Fellowship, and is the co-author with Jim Martin of the widely-used textbook "Speech and Language Processing". Recent research interests include computational semantics, machine translation, the similarities and differences between human and machine speech processing, the linguistics of food, and the application of natural language processing to the social sciences.
